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Background



Earlier in the year, we asked you to share your thoughts and feedback about Umbraco, and your experience in the Umbraco Community. A whopping **122** of you got back to us across **30** questions on a range of topics from contributions to Cloud, to Codegarden.

So, here are those responses!

From all of us in the Umbraco Developer Relations team, a huge thank you and H5YR for taking the time to share this vital feedback.

Now, it's up to us to take action on these.

It's important for us that you know that our door is always open to any and all kinds of feedback. While we can't always promise a solution now or in the future, we hear you and we will ensure that this feedback reaches the right people within Umbraco.

Key takeaways...?

When it came to whittling down the results into a number of key takeaways, it became clear that **it really isn't that simple.**

It's not our place to influence how you should perceive this data. Instead, we hope that you will read into the data yourselves, and make your own conclusions from what they tell you. You can even <u>let us know</u> <u>what you think</u> about the survey results.

One thing that we *would* like to mention is that we found a strong variation in experience and opinion - and this is so important for a healthy Community.

Relationship with Umbraco




What is your relationship with Umbraco?

The Umbraco Community is overwhelmingly made up of developers.

Some people relate more to specific labels, such as 'Contributor' and 'Package Developer'.

Those who selected 'Other' still described themselves as Developers, just added more things!




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How long have you been working with Umbraco?

- 12% of people (15 responses) have been working with Umbraco for less than 2 years
- Almost a third of people (35, 29%) have been with Umbraco for 2 6 years
- 78% of people have been working with Umbraco for at least 2 years

How long have you been working with Umbraco?



What do you find to be the best resources for learning?

- Documentation is by far the biggest resource
- 20 people (17%) use Google or internet searches as a means for learning
- Our is clearly an important hub for Community members with Our, Documentation, Forum being some of the biggest volume responses
- 4 people specifically mentioned Paul Seal's videos




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Do you know about our Discord server?

- 50.5% of respondents are already in the Discord server
- 27.7% of respondents (around 33 people) are possible new members
- Almost a fifth of people are not likely to be using Discord (19.3%, 23 respondents)




How many Umbracians are in your company?

The data suggests two types of companies:

- One or two Umbracians (early/non-Umbraco companies)
- Companies with many Umbracians (Umbraco companies).
- 29 people are the only Umbracians in their company though this (and 0) may also relate to contractors

How many Umbracians are in your company?




Number of Umbracians

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Umbraco training

- 64.2% of the respondents have participated in Umbraco training courses
- 18 respondents are or have been -Umbraco Masters
- Self-taught 21.7% said (or implied*) that they were self-taught using resources such as Umbraco TV, YouTube (Paul Seal's videos get a few mentions) and hands-on learning.



The Umbraco CMS




How many Umbraco instances are you running?

40

A huge range of responses here, from **1** to **401** instances.

The majority of respondents (61%) are running up to (and inc.) 20 instances.

How many Umbraco instances are you running?




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Average size of nodes in these instances?

Extreme variation in avg size of nodes, from 1 to 100,000.

The vast majority of instances have between 20 and 500 nodes, with an **average of 1400** (likely skewed by the outliers) and **median of 200**.

The chart is designed to give a purely visual overview of the data, and does not reflect intentional grouping of average sizes of nodes. Average size of nodes in Umbraco instances by respondents





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Which Umbraco versions do you have in production?

51% of respondents are currently working with **v10** - the most up to date version of Umbraco (as of the survey).

69% of respondents are still working with **v7** and/or **v8.** As these versions are before the move to .NET Core framework, they are now considered legacy. Versions in production



Why not upgrade?

- Cost footed by the client is by far the biggest barrier
- Some complain about the workload of rewriting code / re-creating the project from scratch to upgrade
- 31 (26%) noted that they were discouraged by a lack of packages in general, or specific packages in upgrading
- Less than 10% (9 respondents) have updates planned or in progress

- There were 40+ packages mentioned by respondents
- 4 people said 'none', 'I write my own' or prefer 'the cleanest installation possible'.
- The top 5 listed here does not include Umbraco Forms, which was included in responses.


Contributing to Umbraco



How do you contribute to the Umbraco Community?

- There truly are a great number of ways people feel like they can contribute to the Umbraco Community
- 10 examples of contributions do not directly involve coding
- The forum boasts the most engagement among different areas
 - 49% of respondents contribute via forum posts and submitting issues; 50% via forum replies

Contribution type




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What best describes you as a contributor? (1/2)

- Prolific I live and breathe Umbraco.




What best describes you as a contributor?

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What best describes you as a contributor? (2/2)


- The most common type of contributor is "irregular", where they would like to contribute more but are blocked by time
- <1% of contributors are lapsed (1 respondent)
- 45% / 50 respondents (Shy + Irregular) are blocked from contributing more than they could
- 27.9% / 31 respondents (Social + Reluctant) feel like part of the Community despite not actively contributing



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Barriers to contributing

- Time is by far the biggest barrier Community members face to contributing
- 21 respondents mentioned a barrier where we could *potentially* do something about (see next slide)



How can we help?

59% of responses said that more time is the only way to help them contribute more.

Unfortunately, that's not something we can help with!

But some suggestions of what we could do to help include:

- More documentation and content on contributing, particularly getting started
- Better incentives for contributing i.e. more recognition
- More clarity on issues and how to contribute
- Faster turnaround on merged PRs
- A more human touch
- Modernising the technology of the CMS
- Mentoring
- Hackathons on bigger issues

Users and clients



What do your users love about Umbraco? (1/2)

Ease of use and editor experience are the most commonly mentioned among responses

The data reaffirms that Umbraco is a simple, user-friendly, intuitive, and clean CMS for any and all.

The extensibility, customizability, and flexibility of Umbraco allow developers to create and shape almost anything possible for their clients, and deliver a tailored editor experience.



What do your users love about Umbraco? (2/2)

- "The content editing experience our customers rave about it. And it's extensibility we've never come across a challenge we couldn't overcome with Umbraco as the platform"
- "Back-office UI; a nicely designed, customized, integrated experience (aka a GREAT implementation!)"
- "Content editing is intuitive and can be done by never-before-used-Umbraco editors.
- "The backoffice is very intuitive. I've rolled out the backoffice to well over a 100 editors and I've honestly never had 1 time when someone was unable to "get it".
- "Sandbox product, rather than lumping in features they don't want or need, overcomplicating the solution (and cost)"
- "Editors from other CMSs are often in awe, when they see the power and simplicity of Umbraco."
- "Quick on-boarding, intuitive ui, flexibility to allow devs build whatever ui the users need"
- "Friendliness and no bull a"

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What would your users change about Umbraco? (1/3)


The biggest pain points concern

- The backoffice UX/UI
- The editing experience
- Administration

4 respondents recognise that users woes are often down to the implementation not the CMS.

3 respondents explicitly said that users wouldn't change a thing about Umbraco.

Many respondents also highlight that some wishes of their users may actually make life harder for them.



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What would your users change about Umbraco? (2/3) Common themes

Plugins, integrations and DXP

7 (11%) people mentioned plugins, integrations, and DXP in this questions. These ranged from

- Having a marketplace for apps, themes, components, property editors
- Making the process easier
- Having more available
- Having more OOTB

Perception change from other CMSs

7 people mentioned WYSIWYG 5 people specifically mentioned WordPress as a comparison, in relation to

- UI/UX
- One-click upgrades
- Hosting prices

Block Grid Editor

6 people said that their users ask for a solution that closely resembles the upcoming Block Grid Editor.

Upgrades

5 people mentioned an easier upgrade flow for users.



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Which Umbraco products do you use?

- 26 respondents (23%) do not use a commercial Umbraco product
- 67% (77) are using Umbraco Forms
- 38% (44) are using Umbraco Cloud



- Azure App service is the most popular hosting service used.
- 40% of respondents to this question are using Umbraco Cloud

Count

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If you could make Umbraco Cloud into a magical unicorn, what would that look like for you? (1/3) Common themes

More affordable

18 people (44%) mentioned the price of Cloud being a barrier.

4 people suggested restructuring the price tier, adding an extra tier between Starter and Standard, and considering differing security needs.

Deployment

13 people (17%) suggested an overhaul of the deployment system

- More like uSync
- Deploy from build pipeline
- Bring your own repo

Developer experience

8 people mentioned the developer experience, with 4 citing a lack of control. Others mentioned no control over caching, lack of code flexibility/option of PRs and introducing an intermediate repository.

Reliability, stability and availability

5 people referred to issues of uptime and availability, deployment, or bugs.

Only **41 responses** were recorded for this question (not including responses such as 'N/A' or '?'). <u>See</u> page 65 for more details.

Only one person said that they had no need for the service Umbraco Cloud offers.


Codegarden

57% of Community members (who responded) have not been to Codegarden.




If you haven't attended Codegarden, why not?

- No. Travel



If you haven't attended Codegarden, why not?


- Almost a quarter of people (22%) have never attended Codegarden because of travel to, or distance from, Denmark. This might also explain why there are so many in the Community who have never been
- 7 respondents did not know why they should attend Codegarden.
- 13 respondents 15% mentioned ticket prices as a barrier to attending

What were your key takeaways from attending Codegarden?

- 61% of respondents mentioned the people, which is clearly the biggest draw for Community members.
- 5 people suggested that Codegarden was a good place to learn about the position and direction of Umbraco



Why do you feel the way you do about Umbraco? (1/2)

Positive sentiment dominated by words like friendly, easy, community, great, cms, love - to express sentiment about:

- The power and functionality of the CMS
- The Community
- The company and relationship with developers



Why do you feel the way you do about Umbraco? (2/2)

Responses to 'perhaps the word love is a little strong' referred to complaints and frustrations around:

- Upgrades process, breaking chances and the new LTS
- Bugs in the CMS
- Processing of PRs
- Lack of non-cloud headless functionality
- Volume/quality of tutorials and docs

A few mentioned that it is just a software after all, and that there are no stronger feelings related to that.

- It's been exciting to experience the growth of Umbraco over the past 7 years, and that experience has me excited for the next 7 years!
- Umbraco has one of the best developer-communities in open source, and alongside HQ I believe the CMS has unlimited potential.

Describe us in one sentence (3/3) Some criticisms

- Doing better than before, but not quite there yet
- I do really like the product and the direction of travel, the main frustration is that I often have to reinvent the wheel for your paid offerings as they're extortionate.
- I think Umbraco CMS' flexibility is its biggest strength but also its biggest weakness, as it opens many doors but can also lead to frustrating situations for developers.
- Used to be a great, open, fun company, that seems to have taken the turn from fun startup to starting to become a corporate whale.
- Umbraco is a good CMS that quickly becomes outdated.

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What is Umbraco's biggest challenge right NOW? Common responses

Upgrades and release cadence

20 people (21%) mentioned the difficulty in upgrading Umbraco, and the new cadence. The common sentiment is fear of upgrading without breaking packages, or current instances.

Backoffice

13 people (14%) expressed concern about the backoffice and/or the use of AngularJS

Brand and Market positioning

13 people (14%) said that Umbraco's current challenge is navigating the market, establishing as a key player, competition, awareness - 3 said staying relevant (in terms of technology) as part of this
9 (9%) said keeping the balance between commercial success and OSS, 3 said staying true to Umbraco

Documentation

6 said the Documentation

Brand and market positioning

16 people (19%) said competition with other major players like WP. 5 mentioned the U.S. in particular. **10 said** balance between commercial success, **2** staying relevant

Upgrades

13 mentioned upgrades - keeping track of changes, getting developers comfortable to migrate, or even getting people from .NET to .NET Core with 9

Technology

6 said technology i.e. Angular, .NET and one even mentioned C#

What is Umbraco's biggest win?

- Almost a quarter (23%) named the move to .NET Core as Umbraco's biggest win
- 15% of respondents said that the Community is Umbraco's biggest win
- 7 respondents (around 7%) said that being open-source is Umbraco's biggest win
- 3 people mentioned the adoption of MVC, Microsoft tech, and C# as Umbraco's biggest win
- Document types and Belle UI were features named as biggest wins

10% mentioned the brand/company itself

- Taking the right tough decisions (V5)
- Remained true to itself
- Unique brand
- Reputation
- Balance between commercial and community in growth
- Staying relevant
- Stability
- Dropping v5, and recovering from it

40% mentioned the product

Methodology



Qualitative analysis

Qualitative answers were first **sorted into loose categories** by members of the DevRel team.

These categories were used to quantify the types of responses received to best reflect the feedback.

Word clouds

The website <u>https://www.wordclouds.com/</u> was used to create the word clouds.

Words with a frequency of less than 3 were removed.

Omitted responses

Due to the qualitative nature of the responses, some responses were omitted from the overall results.


Omissions were made due to

- No or little relevance to the question asked
- No concrete feedback that could be extracted from the response

This was particularly relevant for the question on Umbraco Cloud (*If you could make Umbraco Cloud into a magical unicorn, what would that look like for you?*), where 14 responses were responded to in a very literal sense - with no real feedback.

- A white pony with an inverted ice cream cone on its head.
- Bold, proud and colourful!
- ... A literal unicorn? I guess, super friendly, free rides, lots of rainbows and sparkles...
- A stick (the horn) inserted into mashed potato with peas as eyes. It might taste nice and it might look vaguely like a Unicorn but ultimately it's still just mashed potato with peas as eyes.

This was also the case for question "What are your must-have Umbraco Plugins (packages)?" where we omitted the tallies for Umbraco Forms - to allow Community packages to be better represented.
